PATRICK M. CONNORS is the Albert and Angela Farone Distinguished Professor in New York Civil Practice at Albany Law School, where he teaches New York Practice and Legal Ethics. He received his B.A. degree from Georgetown University and his J.D. degree from St. John’s Law School, where he was an editor of the *Law Review* and research assistant to Professor David D. Siegel.

Upon graduation from St. John’s in 1988, Professor Connors served as a personal law clerk to Judge Richard D. Simons of the New York Court of Appeals until 1991. From 1991 until May of 2000 he was an associate and then member of the litigation department at Hancock & Estabrook, LLP, in Syracuse, New York.

In January 2013, Professor Connors became the author for the *New York Practice* treatise, which is now in its sixth edition. He is a frequent lecturer at continuing legal education seminars across New York State.
